

Competitors are advised to read the Rules and Conditions as set out in this syllabus.

Please note: It will be necessary for competitors to purchase a Programme so that the date and times of each section will be known.

RULES AND CONDITIONS GOVERNING COMPETITORS FOR ENTIRE EISTEDDFOD These Rules are to be read in conjunction with the Rules as set out at the start of the relevant syllabus for each discipline area.

1. These competitions are open to Amateurs Only. An amateur shall be defined as any person whose income is not totally derived from the exercise of his or her talents in the particular class for which they have entered. This rule shall not apply to conductors or accompanists. Competitors who are engaged in any dancing teaching activities can enter in any age section only.

- 2. In all competitions that are subject to the Age Limit, the age on the First day of September shall be deemed to be the age of the competitor. A Birth Certificate, or other satisfactory proof of age, must be submitted by competitors entering the competitions for the first time (other than in the Adult or Open Sections).
- 3. The Syllabus and Entry Forms are also available on the Society's web page: www.waggaeisteddfod.org.au

ENTRIES:

- 4. Entries for all competitors must be made on the Society's Entry Form or via Comps Online on or before the date appointed for the closing of entries, as detailed in the Syllabus.
- 5. All entries to be posted to PO Box 505, Wagga Wagga. NSW. 2650. Please mark envelope, Attention: Dance, Speech or Music Secretary. Please enclose a stamped addressed envelope for your receipt, if required.
- 6. All Entry Forms should be clearly completed in **Blue or Black** ink.
- 7. No entry will be accepted or recorded unless accompanied by full fees. The scale of fees is set out in this Syllabus.
- 8. Any entry forms received with part payment will be returned to sender for correction.
- 9. No entry fees will be refunded in cases where the competitors do not appear or withdraw from any section.
- 10. Competitors must not render the same item in more than one section, unless specified in the individual discipline's regulations.
- 11. It is the responsibility of the Competitor/Parent/Teacher to ensure all entries have been correctly completed. The Committee takes no responsibility for incorrect submissions and competitors competing in the wrong age group will be disqualified from that section and no mark will be awarded.
- 12. Where there is only one entry received in any section that section may be staged or combined at the discretion of the Committee.

PRIZES:

- 13. In all sections any prize may be withheld at the Adjudicators discretion.
- 14. No special prizes will be permitted except those suggested by the Adjudicator.
- 15. If place getters tie, the prized money will be divided equally.
- 16. In any section where there is only one competitor, the section may go ahead but the first prize may not be awarded.
- 17. Certificates will be given where Adjudicator's assessment is "Highly Commended".

PRIZES / PRIZEMONEY

- 18. Prize money will be awarded, at the adjudicator's discretion, as follows:
 - 1 3 Competitors 1st Prize Only
 - 3 7 Competitors 1st and 2nd Prize
 - $8\ or\ more\ Competitors$ 1st, 2nd and 3rd Prizes

All awards are made at the Adjudicator's Discretion

19. Cheques awarded to competitors as prize money must be banked by 21st October. After this date Cheques will be cancelled.

TROPHIES:

20. All "In Perpetuity" trophies remain the property of the Wagga Wagga Eisteddfod Society. Replicas remain the property of the prize-winner. The engraving of all trophies is the responsibility of the winners. All trophies for perpetual competition are indicted by "I.P."

REHEARSAL:

21. Rehearsals on the stage or in the proximity of the stage in the venues in which the competitions are being held or in adjoining hall or halls, will not be allowed.

STAGE:

- 22. Only duly appointed Stage Managers will have full authority to decide who shall be allowed on the stage.
- 23. The order in which competitors shall appear in any section shall be shown as on the Programme unless the Stage Manager or the Committee decide otherwise. Notification will be given to those

- competitors affected by any changes. Rules regarding Props and Scenery, in each discipline, are detailed in the relevant Rules.
- 24. Teachers will not be allowed on the stage except as accompanists or conductors, or at the discretion of the Stage Manager.
- 25. Time limits as stated must be observed.

VENUES:

- 26. Entrance to the venues is by ticket only.
- 27. Competitors will be granted complimentary admittance but only for the session during which they are competing.
- 28. An accompanist and a conductor of a choir or orchestra will be granted complimentary admission to that section. For Dancing Teachers will be supplied with a Teacher Pass.
- 29. No person shall enter or leave a hall while any item is in progress or while the adjudicator is giving their adjudication.

PUBLIC RISK INSURANCE:

30. Any injury incurred during the Festival must be reported in writing to the Convenor within 24 hours together with statements from any witnesses, along with the supply of any medical certificate or report if available.

PERSONAL PROPERTY:

31. All personal property and the safety and care of that property is the sole responsibility of the competitor.

ADJUDICATORS:

- 32. The Committee reserves the right to appoint a substitute for an announced adjudicator.
- 33. No competitor who has been taught or advised by the Adjudicator of that section during the three months prior to the last day of the Eisteddfod shall be eligible to compete in that section.
- 34. The Adjudicator's decision will be final.
- 35. Communicating with the Adjudicators by competitors, teachers, conductors, accompanists or other interested parties prior to and during the competitions is absolutely prohibited. The Committee reserves the right to disqualify a competitor for any breach of this rule.
- 36. Prompting or assistance of any kind must not be given, except by the Adjudicators.
- 37. Competitors may obtain the Adjudications remarks/sheets from the Eisteddfod official who is in attendance at the Committee Desk.

PHOTOGRAPHY/CHILD PROTECTION:

Photography and/or recording by any means, of any School Group performance, is forbidden under all circumstances.

38. For individual items refer to the specific Rules for that Art in this syllabus.

MISCELLANEOUS:

- 39. Competitors are requested not to ask for specific times of appearance. Consideration may be given to those competitors travelling to Wagga when the Programme is arranged. Once the Programme is printed no further alterations in order of appearance can be made.
- 40. Competitors must be at the venue and ready to perform and have reported to the Secretary or the Stage Manager at least 15 minutes before their section is due to commence.
- 41. Competitors will not be able to perform out of section.

COMPLAINTS:

- 42. All complaints will be dealt with by the Executive Committee.
- 43. The decision of the Committee in all questions arising out of or not provide for by the rules and regulations shall be final.
- 44. All protest must be made in writing by competitors or their duly accredited representative to the Secretary within half an hour of the result being announced together with a deposit of \$10.00. If in the opinion of the Committee the protest is deemed frivolous, the deposit will be forfeited.

RULES AND CONDITIONS FOR SPEECH AND DRAMA COMPETITORS – TO BE READ IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE RULES GOVERNING THE EISTEDDFOD

- 1. Dress, posture and demeanour are important parts of performance and will be taken into consideration by the adjudicator
- 2. Competitors will NOT be allowed to perform "out of age".
- 3. Competitors will NOT be permitted to perform "out of Section".
- 4. Competitors must not perform the same item in more than one section except in the Entertainment section.
- 5. The Eisteddfod Committee welcomes competitors of all abilities and capabilities. **If you need any support to perform your best, please contact us.**

"RESTRICTED":

- 6. Restricted means never having won a first prize in that style in a City of Wagga Wagga Eisteddfod and are either taught in Wagga or live within an 80km radius of Wagga Wagga.
- 7. Awarding of prizes is at the discretion of the adjudicator and may be withheld.
- 8. In sections where there are less than five (5) competitors, placing is at the discretion of the Adjudicator.
- 9. The Adjudicator's decision is final.
- 10. No scenery is allowed. Limited hand-held props are permitted, and the Committee will make available two (2) chairs, two (2) tables and three (3) stage boxes for competitors to use. A maximum of three (3) items will be allowed for solo items, and four (4) for duos and groups. It is the Stage Manager's right to refuse inappropriate props.
- 11. Only the lighting provided is to be used.

TIME LIMIT (when specified in the syllabus):

- 12. A short warning bell will sound followed by a longer bell when the time limit is reached. Performers must leave the stage on the second bell and the performance will be assessed to that point.
- 13. **Word Limits and Time Limits** when specified must be adhered to and will be checked.

BIBLE READINGS:

14. All Bible readings must be made from the Bible in all sections. Competitors must use a physical Bible. Paper inserts are not accepted.

Open sections may use any Authorised version EXCEPT the Good News Bible. For all other Age groups, the Bible used may be either the Good News Bible or NIV Bible.

For Open, and Intermediate sections a copy of the reading must be handed to the Secretary prior to the Session.

PROSE READINGS:

15. Must be from the set book. Competitors must read from a physical book. Paper inserts are not accepted. A clean copy of the chosen section to be handed to the Recording Secretary before commencement of the session.

"OWN CHOICE" ITEMS:

16. A clean copy of the selection is to be handed to the Recording Secretary at the commencement of the Session in which the competitor will appear. The section and competitor number must be clearly marked on the copy. Please do not include competitor names.

VENUE:

- 17. NO PERSON SHALL ENTER OR LEAVE THE VENUE WHILE ANY PERFORMANCE IS IN PROGRESS.
- 18. Audience members must pay the required admission fee.
- 19. Prompting or assistance of any kind must not be given, except by the adjudicator.
- 20. The decision of the Committee in all questions arising from, or not provided in, the Rules and Conditions shall be final.

COPYRIGHT:

21. The law of Copyright applies to the Eisteddfod. Copies of poems, readings etc will be accepted for the Adjudicator, but will be destroyed after the performance.

CHAMPIONSHIPS:

22. Competitors in each age group are automatically entered for the Championship Award, if they compete in the specified sections (as detailed in the syllabus). The Championship is awarded to the Competitor with the highest aggregate. If the first place is tied, a count back based on the marks received for the Set Recital and Reading will then be used. If this does not determine a winner then the Set Recital mark shall be used, and only then if this still results in a tie will a Joint Champion be declared. Placings for the Championship may be tied.

TROPHIES:

- 23. "In Perpetuity", when presented, will be held by the winning competitor until August 1 of the next year. They must be returned to the Secretary **polished**, **engraved**, **and ready** for the next Eisteddfod. Holders of trophies are responsible for their safe custody, and in the case of loss or damage, must pay the Society for their replacement.
- 24. Engraving of Trophies is at the expense of the winning competitor.
- 25. Recording/Photographing of choirs on Choral Speech Day is forbidden. Please organise with your school for an alternative time to record performances.
- 26. Recording/photographing of any performers whilst on stage is not allowed. This is for the protection and benefit of all performers.
- 27. If you enter via Comps-Online, you agree to abide by their terms and conditions.
